What Parents & Educators Need to Know about TRACKING DEVICES

Bluetooth tracking devices like Apple's AirTag and Samsung's SmartTags have exploded in popularity, with millions sold each year. These small tools help people locate their lost items, but their discreet design has also made them attractive for more sinister purposes. From stalking to bullying, tracking devices present unique risks that trusted adults need to understand and address.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

STALKING AND HARASSMENT

Because of their tiny size and unassuming appearance, tracking devices can easily be hidden in bags or clothing. They've been used to monitor individuals without their knowledge, with a lawsuit in the US labelling AirTags "the weapon of choice of stalkers and abusers". In the UK, use of tracking devices in coercive control and stalking cases reportedly rose by 317 percent between 2018 and 2023.

TOOLS FOR BULLYING

Tracking devices could allow bullies to follow or locate their targets even outside of school. This makes it difficult for children to find refuge, potentially extending the trauma of bullying into spaces – like home – that should feel safe and secure.

FALSE ACCUSATIONS

Because tracking devices are linked to user accounts, they could be misused to 'prove' ownership of someone else's possessions. Someone could, for example, plant a tracker on another person's belongings to falsely claim them as their own.

INVASION OF PRIVACY

These devices are designed to share location data with the user via other people's phones, which can unintentionally broadcast someone's movements without their consent. This makes them vulnerable to being monitored by strangers without realising.

DIFFICULT TO DETECT

Many tracking devices are designed to be discreet, but that also means they're easy to hide. Without proactive checking or the right tech to detect them, children and young people might not realise they're being tracked.

Advice for Parents & Educators

WATCH FOR WARNING SIGNS

If a child's peers always seem to know their location – whether in person or hinted at online – it could be worth checking for tracking devices. Some, like AirTags, will eventually make a noise if separated from their owner. Listen out for a chirping sound.

CHECK LIKELY HIDING SPOTS

Common places where trackers may be planted include jacket linings, bag seams, pockets, or under bike seats. If you find one, take a photo of the serial number before disposing of it – this could help police trace the account it's linked to.

USE DETECTION APPS

Apple devices running iOS 14.5 or later will notify users of unknown AirTags nearby. Android users can install Apple's 'Tracker Detect' or the third-party app 'AirGuard' to scan for tracking devices from various manufacturers.

HAVE THE CONVERSATION

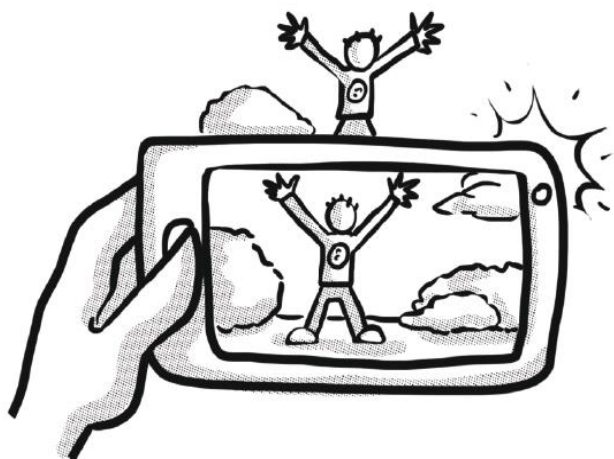
Talk to your child about what tracking devices are, what signs to look out for, and how they might be misused. Emphasise the legal consequences of using them to prank, harass, or monitor someone.

Did you know?



Resilience is the ability to overcome adversity, 'bounce back' during difficult times and get back to feeling good. It is about having the capacity to adapt to difficult circumstances, and using tools and resources available to do so.

The Institute of Health Equity suggests that resilient individuals, families and communities are more able to deal with difficulties and adversities than those with less resilience. Building resilience is fundamental to teenagers becoming happy and functioning adults. Young people who are not resilient will be more likely to respond to stress by developing anxiety and depression.

Evidence suggests that promoting resilience can help young people sustain good relationships, develop personal life skills, overcome challenges, cope in difficult situations and help them to achieve their potential. Human brains develop and change more during the teenage years than most other times in their life. This means that this is a time when there is huge potential for the development of new skills and capabilities.



What can you do?

Help your child navigate their ups and downs by encouraging them to carry out resilient behaviours. You can be a building block in helping them build healthy habits, such as looking after their mental health, getting enough sleep, doing exercise, eating healthy food, hobbies, socialising or relaxing. Staying connected with different people in our lives is the basis for building resilience. Help your child to understand who is in their support network when they

face difficult situations. This may be a grandparent, friend, teacher, sibling or sports coach etc. Encourage your child to make time to build relationships, see friends, have fun, take part in hobbies and connect with others regularly.

Encourage your child to build resilience by taking on new opportunities, challenges and achieving goals by stepping out of their comfort zone. This will help them to develop self-respect, be organised, promote positive thinking and to build confidence to deal with different situations.

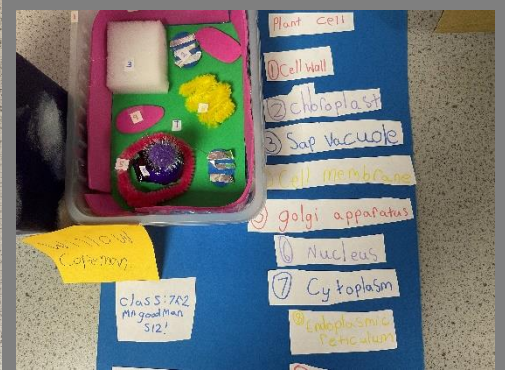
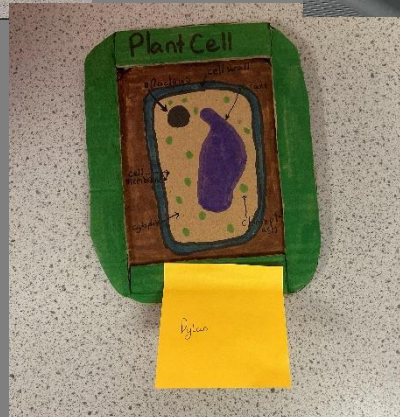
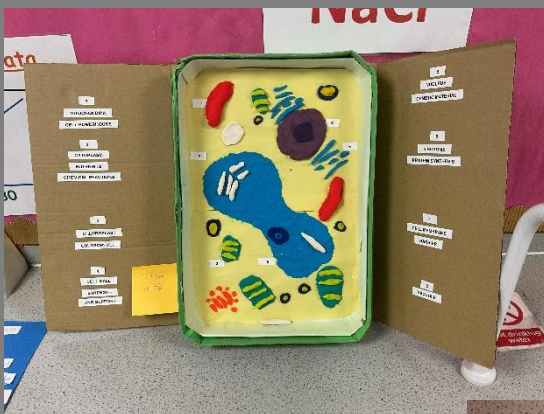
Mr Goodman's Year 7 Science class:

In continuing with celebrating, if there any extracurricular activities our students do please let me know, as I absolutely love celebrating my year 10's achievements, not just from in school, but out too.

Please remember uniform is not an option, uniform is part of being a KLA student and a really important part of their future too, teaching them when there is a dress code to follow, it has to be followed. I always explain in the workplace they will be expected to dress according to the workplace policy, the same as the contract they signed when they started KLA, meaning there is no wiggle-room, it is not optional. **Ties are not optional, neither are blazers. Jumpers are optional, however they do not take the place of blazers.**

Hoodies are not permitted inside of the school, neither are any other type of jumper/sportswear.

This leads me on to leggings. Leggings are becoming an issue for a few girls who think they are a choice. **Leggings are not allowed at all.** Please can I ask you support me in enforcing this rule. As stated at the end of last term, incorrect uniform will result in a 15 min lunch detention. This seems to be the only way to get uniform correct again as incorrect items and "forgetting ties and blazers" seem too easy to use as an excuse.

Bags and equipment are essential parts of the students' uniform also. Please can you ensure your young person has theirs every day.

PE kits – Still too many kits are being loaned out (which is then washed and sorted again by our wonderful Miss White which takes up so much time!). Please can I ask you make sure your young person brings their kit in on PE days.

Finally, just a reminder, students are to **arrive before 08:30am** with lessons beginning at 08:35am.

Everything else:

We really need to get attendance levels back up, but a big thank you to those of you who try to get your young people into school, it makes such a difference to their learning and ultimately, their GCSE results.

The UK Government state that "Year 11 pupils with near-perfect attendance are almost twice as likely to achieve grade 5 in English and Maths GCSE, compared to similar pupils attending 90-95% of the time. In other words, missing just 10 extra

days a year reduces the likelihood of achieving these grades by around 50%.” It definitely food for thought and really is a reason to get them into school every day.
